COURSE DESCRIPTION

Students learn about, perform and work on a theatrical production. Shop and studio work is complemented by lectures and demonstrations on the technical components of a theater production. Topics covered include: designers and their functions; scenic and costume construction techniques; stage rigging, hardware, and material; stage procedures and safety. Simple drafting projects and the ability to read floor plans and stage elevations are stressed.

There are always readings/videos in every module to expand your understanding of the work we are doing in class. It is not mandatory to view all of the videos or articles. The Prezis in each module helps you finish the module assignment and quiz.

- Your final exam is all of your previous quizzes. If you use the quizzes as preparation, you will do fine on the final exam.
