COURSE DESCRIPTION

Actors continue to work on freeing and extending their natural voice, developing a voice in contact with emotional impulse, and strengthening this connection. This course includes a progression from first-semester work applied to classical texts with a strong emphasis on Shakespeare. Students develop an awareness of the devices of language and poetry necessary for speaking verse, and they continue using the International Phonetic Alphabet, followed by beginning dialect work.

Week 2: Introduction of different Voice Pedagogies: Lessac, Linklater, Berry, Rodenburg, Fitzmaurice, Suzuki, and Viewpoints. Module 2 Journal due September 18, 2022.

Week 3: IPA drill (The Plosives) and then Lessac exercises. Module 3 Journal due September 25, 2022.

Week 4: IPA drill (consonants: the glides) and then Linklater exercises. Module 4 Journal due October 2, 2022.

Week 5: IPA drill (consonants: nasals, plosives, fricatives) and then Rodenburg exercises. Module 5 Journal is due October 9, 2022.

Week 6: IPA drill (vowels) and then Fitzmaurice exercises. Module 6 Journal is due October 16, 2022.

Week 7: IPA drill (vowel "r") and Suzuki exercises. Module 7 Journal is due October 23, 2022.

Week 8: IPA drill (diphthongs and triphthongs) and Viewpoint exercises. Module 8 Journal is due October 30, 2022.

Week 9: IPA drill (a competitive game in groups). Module 9 Journal is due November 6, 2022.

Week 10: IPA and dialects introduction. Module 10 Journal is due November 13, 2022.

Week 11: Assign final projects and begin exercises to work on: a dialect piece and a classical piece. Module 11 Journal is due November 20, 2022.

Week 12: Voice exercises to help the final project. Module 12 Journal is due December 4, 2022.

Week 13: Voice exercises to help the final project. Module 13 Journal is due December 11, 2022.

Week 14: Voice exercises to help the final project. Module 14 Journal is due December 18, 2022.

Week 15: Final project presentations are due to the assignment link by December 21, 2022; the Module 15 Journal is due December 21, 2022, by 5 PM.

• DISCUSSIONS

- You will need to respond with college-level spelling and grammar. If you cite something, be sure to use MLA. (There is a tutorial available if you do not know how to cite...).
- JOURNALS
- Journal entries happen at the beginning and the ending of every class; they count for your attendance and participation. You will need to respond with college-level spelling and grammar. Please turn on Grammarly on your computer and your phone to help you be successful.
- Journals are due for every module; you must respond with college-level spelling and grammar. Turn on Grammarly on your phone and computer to help you be successful. You need to write about one thing your learned, one thing you can use in your theater career, and one thing you have questions about or you would like more information.

• ASSIGNMENTS/PROJECTS

Assignments: There are 15 Weekly Journals, 15 Top of Class Journal Entries, and 15 End of Class Journal Entries. There are also 5 Drill Sheets for IPA.

Projects: You will have one final project that will be a heightened text/classical monologue paired with a dialect monologue. These will be performed in class for your final exam.

There are always readings/videos in every module to expand your understanding of the work we are doing in class. They are not mandatory to view, but they will help you grow in this work and help with your weekly journal entries.

- QUIZZES/TESTS/ASSESSMENTS
- There are no formal quizzes or tests, although there will be a group IPA contest.
- Your final exam is your Final Project: Two monologues One heightened/classical text and one dialect monologue; this is a Performative Assessment.
